- **Public Speaking:** My experience in public speaking started with taking little parts of legal speeches that my Mother, Karen Budd-Falen was giving. I then traveled around the state of Wyoming speaking to groups of children for the Farm Safety for Just Kids program. I spoke for the first time on my own for the New Mexico Women in Agriculture conference on June 1, 2017 about self-defense and empowering women, I was also contracted as a women's health panelist and self-defense instructor for FarmHer's national convention in June 2018. I have also spoken for the Wyoming FFA Fire Conference, various Ag Women Connect events, National Cattlemen's Beef Association, American Cattlewomen's association, Ole Miss College of Law and other organizations.
